All to Jesus I Surrender

Can we honestly sing that word “all”?

The widow of Mark 12 gave “all she owned, all she had to live on.” Jesus requires the same of every disciple. “None of you can be My disciple who does not give up all his own possessions” (Luke 14:33).

How do we surrender all? The rich ruler—needing to clarify his commitment—literally had to sell all his assets to benefit the poor. For the apostles, dedication meant leaving their houses. For faithful Philemon, it meant keeping his house to serve the church and missionaries. For James, surrender meant early martyrdom. For his brother John, it meant a long life of service. Avenues of sacrifice vary, but the attitude of total surrender remains the same.

If citizens of the Kingdom don't support Kingdom causes, no one else will.

By Christ's call and cultivation, every disciple becomes generous. But there are so many good causes ranging from politics to pets, education to endangered species. How should we decide? Here is a wise principle: My higher priority is that which I can do that others cannot (such as being a parent to my children). My lower priority is that which others can do just as well. Millions support the world's charities, but relatively few seek *first* the Kingdom of God. If Christian resources go to what others can do, little remains for Kingdom priorities. If citizens of the Kingdom don't support Kingdom causes, no one else will. Even congregations stray, investing in self-service instead of the biblical priorities of caring for the needy and spreading the saving Gospel.

Even among Christian charities, worthy choices abound. Shall we decide based on who promotes best? Missionaries cannot compete with slick professionals. Does that make the latter more important? No, for true missionaries are clearly in line with New Testament priorities.

Shall we decide based on emotion? Many pleas tug at heart-strings, but will lives really be changed? Jesus designates the Gospel as His power to save and

transform. For that reason, World Bible School focuses on sharing the *Gospel*. The method is simple and direct, engaging thousands of *everyday saints* as missionaries, connecting first through Internet and mail (where many cautious seekers start), then through face-to-face follow up. The resulting track-record is well-established and confirmed daily.

As you make decisions this giving season, remember this priority principle: If Kingdom citizens don't support Kingdom causes, no one else will. Do you see World Bible School as directly in line with the King's Commission? Do you see WBS as an arrow flying straight to the bull's eye? If you share this priority, aiming at the central target rather than outer rings, then support WBS with the generous and sacrificial spirit that Jesus exemplified and inspires. In disease-stricken Liberia and Sierra Leone, Isaac Daye is using the new Gospel Chariot to do relief work and to teach Ebola awareness clinics while distributing food and supplies to those that need it the most. They have also been bringing messages of hope and salvation as epitomized by their banner: “Bad news, Ebola Kills!!! Good News, Jesus Saves!!!”

The WBS team has carried on having seminars and graduation campaigns in the areas least effected by the spread of Ebola and have been able to lead many to faith in Christ.

Jacob Sessay coordinates our work in Sierra Leone. He writes the following: “We are in a situation where experts have tried their level best to fight the cases of Ebola, but it is still on the increase and the number of infected cases is on the rise. Many are hospitalized with no guarantee of medication treatment. Families and individuals are quarantined for 21

days as the case warrants and hundreds have lost their lives. The masses are crying for help but this does not seem to work. We now completely focus our attention on God Almighty for His mercy upon the people of West Africa and all other affected areas for the eradication of this killer disease. Sierra Leone is a very poor country. Some brethren are trapped in

the quarantined areas and cannot get food or medication. Please keep praying for Africa as a whole, Sierra Leone in particular as the people are suffering and crying to God for help.”

Jacob continues, “As Ebola ransacks and takes so many lives, some of the living are giving their lives to Christ in baptism. We thank God for Alice and Marda who surrendered their all to Jesus for the cleansing of their sins through baptism. They are now our new brother and sister in the Lord.”

At the recent Liberia Conference held in Nashville, many ministries came together as partners to deliver medical supplies to the affected regions. Everyone is doing their part to make a difference in this hard-hit area of Africa. The crisis is far from over and needs our prayers.

Churches Can “Match” to Grow the Kingdom.

World Bible School has been blessed with a matching challenge of \$100,000! Any gift from a new donor or any increase in 2014 over 2013 counts. Individuals can help. Churches can also help. For example, if a church

gave \$1,000 in 2013, and gives \$2,000 in 2014, the increase of \$1,000 counts toward WBS claiming the matching funds.

But let's clarify something. Sometimes church leaders notice WBS in their church budget and conclude that the church is supporting WBS. Often the church is purchasing WBS material—reimbursing WBS for producing and printing—but is not donating to WBS. Some 600 congregations have

postal WBS programs. Only 79 congregations send regular support to WBS. So that means there are plenty of churches left who can take advantage of the \$100,000 match. Some of the 79 can afford to increase, and hundreds more can begin to support WBS—all of which qualifies for the match! You can do a great service by bringing this clarifying article to the attention of your leaders.

Please make sure your church gives, too.

This is a special appeal for churches to support WBS financially beyond purchasing materials. Here are some ways: 1) Leaders decide on a gift this year. 2) Involve members by designating a specific “Impact Sunday” to collect for WBS (perhaps a fifth Sunday). 3) Add to the church budget a regular gift to WBS. 4) Pass along windfall or left-over funds to bless WBS outreach. Every gift goes into fulfilling

the Great Commission.

How about double your money—plus?



Though unbelievable as a material investment, a present investment (gift) in WBS effectively doubles in value. That's a practical beauty of the matching gift challenge that is before us—and you—right now.

Want to know another way to boost the impact of your gift? Give appreciated stock. Giving an asset that has appreciated over time can save you a lot of money. If you sell it, there's a capital gains tax to pay on the appreciated amount. But if you give it, you'll avoid paying the capital gains tax and still be able to deduct the amount of the gift.

Consider someone who gives \$10,000 worth of mutual fund shares. The initial purchase value was \$4,000. The capital gains owed on the \$6,000 could be 15% for mid-to-high earners, even 20% for those in the highest tax bracket. Plus, high earners will owe a 3.8% surcharge on the income, too, as part of the Affordable Care Act. \$6,000 times 23.8% means \$1,698 is due in taxes. Ouch.

Making the asset a charitable gift puts money you would pay in taxes back in your pocket. Many donors decide just to donate that much more. So, let your gift double...plus.

Please join us in welcoming Sheila Berry as our new Student Mail Coordinator at Cedar Park. Sheila, a native of Austin, Texas, began with WBS in June.



She and her husband, Keith, have two grown children, Sheldon and Shelby. They are members of the Westside church of Christ in Round Rock. Sheila and her family are longtime friends with Tex and Mary Jane Williams who led WBS for some 20 years.

Sheila's workplace looks like a post office. Each sorting bin has a unique WBS code for each congregation that has a postal program. Students in developing nations cannot afford to mail answers directly to America, so they send their WBS correspondence answers to their nation's WBS Service Center to have it forwarded to Sheila's office. Using WBS codes, Sheila sends the mail to teachers via their respective coordinators.

She says of her work with WBS, "I am amazed at all the people whose lives we can touch and change all over the world. And as a WBS teacher, I'm reminded that, even though I've been with the church all my life, there's always room to learn and grow."

Gratitude for the Global Missions Conference

The colorful 20 page GMC program opened with, "Welcome to the fourth Global Missions Conference!" Held every three years, previous GMCs had taken place in Arlington TX. This GMC (October 16-18) was hosted in the Memphis area by Goodman Oaks church of Christ in Southaven, MS. We are deeply grateful for the servant-hearts of Goodman Oaks leaders and members who made this brotherhood-wide event possible. Working with the GMC Steering Committee, the overall coordinators were John and Beth Reese assisted by teams at World Bible School and InterMission missionary care.

The total number who registered was 792, and many others also participated. Each plenary session highlighted a geographical section of the world: Africa, North and Central America, Asia and Oceania, South America, and Europe. Key note speakers were Machona Monyamane, John Reese, Gary Jackson, David Duncan and Monte Cox. 13 multiple-session "Tracks" addressed subjects such as Short Terms Missions, Missionary Care, Latino Missions, Chinese Missions, University Outreach and U.S. Missions. "Breakout Sessions" ranged from tips for raising funds to helping missionary kids, and from multimedia tools to mission committees. "Interest Group Sessions" included focuses on China, World Christian Broadcasting,



Disaster Relief and more. One highlight was "A Conversation with Leaders from White's Ferry Road Church" which emphasized growing receptivity in the United States, prison and recovery work, and Gospel opportunities. Audio CDs may be ordered from DoveDoveCassettes.com.

John Reese's speech, entitled "Mobilize for America," emphasized open doors as indicated by responses to WBS Internet advertising and teaching. During our six month Gospel Chariot tour of Ghana's Volta Region we worked with 33 congregations. Activities included enrolling students for World Bible School, distributing tracts in strategic locations, open air preaching each night and house to house personal Bible studies each morning. All of these activities are assisted by local members of the church, who also provide food and lodging for the GC team. By the end of the tour, we had baptized 138 souls, distributed over 30,000 tracts and enrolled 8,445 new students to WBS Bible courses. These students were enrolled from the high schools, house to house, market places and on the streets.

Westover Hills, a Sharing Congregation

The Westover Hills church of Christ in Austin has long shared the Gospel through World Bible School. Among its early leaders were WBS Directors Reuel Lemmons and Tex Williams.

Current WBS deacon Chuck Gentry and WBS coordinators Sharon and Don Gardner shared these figures: In 2013, Westover teachers sent a total of 61,800 WBS postal lessons, and they are on pace to exceed that in 2014. Through the end of September, they had sent 52,305 lessons and received 416 baptism requests. About 84% of lessons have gone to Zimbabwe, 8% to Ghana and 5% to Tanzania.

Scanning student answers at the WBS Service Center in Zimbabwe has cut median return time from 212 days to 112 days. Tanzania and Ghana seem to have better postal systems with median turnaround times of 127 days and 133 days.

Sharon met some of her students during a 2002 Westover campaign in Northern Ghana. Since 2000 Westover has sent biennial campaigns there, and WBS lessons have gone to well over 30,000 teens—about half being Muslims.

over the next three years, beginning with up to 40 in September 2015. Each school will have up to 600 students. The remaining schools will be opened over the next two years. Ghanaian schools that have long valued character training require Religious and Moral Education (RME). In fulfilling this need, Dr. Tawiah has arranged to field RME teachers at these new schools using WBS as introductory material. He calls this the Ghana Bible Reading Project (GBRP). Each participating school will partner with an established American WBS postal program. Because of this new dynamic, reliability and timeliness will become all the more important. Nearly 100% retention will build strong relationships and solid Bible knowledge.

This continuing partnership will guarantee thousands of students year after year—blessing many in the next generation of Ghanaians. Such an unprecedented opportunity should not be missed, and we will work to make the most of it. But to do this, WBS needs both participants and resources. For details, please contact me or Sherri Hays (512-345-8190) or Ron Pottberg (512-635-8519). GBRP, of course, is additional to impressive numbers for Ghana already, including many thousands who continue to enroll voluntarily in Islamic Northern Ghana. Overall, our Cedar Park office alone has enrolled over 64,000 new students Ghana-wide so far in 2014.

Personal involvement and financial commitment needed to spread the Gospel.

Some who think of WBS as “well-known” mistakenly translate that to mean “well-funded.” They are used to ministries that focus on fund-raising.



WBS focuses first on *involvement*. It is valid to give dollars for *others* to work, but WBS seeks to be more personal. Certainly we raise funds, but for a singular purpose: to engage more and more of *you*—the everyday Christian—in fulfilling the Great Commission. Hence our watchword is “You. Sharing Jesus.” WBS connects the Christian who wants to teach with the seeker who wants to learn. The more who become involved, the more the Gospel reaches “every creature” locally and globally.

This emphasis on practical recruitment, equipping and training reduces time for fund raising. If I have spoken where you are, you may have noticed: My presentation calls for personal involvement and often does not get around to money. Some may regard that as an opportunity lost. But our desire is to focus where the Lord focuses. At the same time, if He opens a door for funding, we certainly want to work with Him and you to go through that door.

We believe the Great Commission urges us all forward. God keeps opening new doors to speed His Word to the lost.

One problem with involvement is that church leaders often mistake course purchases for support (see page 3). Actually, while many use and value WBS, not all realize what it takes to develop such effective methods and networks for everyday Christians to reach millions.

Should WBS cut back? We believe the Great Commission urges us all forward. God keeps opening new doors to speed His Word to lost populations. Take, for example, the Ghana Project (see page 2). Should we turn it down? No. Though it stretches both faith and resources, we accept the challenge. Why? *Trust*. We trust that if our Father opens this door, He also provides all that implies. We enter this Ghanaian door assured that God knows how to touch hearts to participate (40 congregations needed) and to support (over \$40,000 needed for start-up). We do not believe it is a coincidence that the match comes at this particular time (see page 3). We share your priority to engage teachers to reach the lost, and we believe that through you God will provide.


